I felt that we achieved a great deal that evening and we on the Community Council and Dr. Needham are convinced that, like us, you want the best for our town. Now we will just have to make it happen!

Unfortunately Caledon Park does not seem the way to go, because they have withdrawn their offer of £350,000 to be bonded with Kincardine & Deeside District Council. This would have been used as a basis for starting our wet/dry facility – but not now. Caledon Park seem to be backtracking to an indeer bowling rink backing on to the dual carriageway, access via car parks for their shop units! This is not what you told us you wanted, so due to this and to the vacillation of Caledon Park we voted to oppose this development and await further planning proposals. Another developer may well be prepared to make us the offer which Caledon Park has withdrawn.

On a different track, I see that our new dental surgery is nearing completion - yet another welcome asset to our community. I hope that the time from now to the opening is not too long drawn out!

We have decided that the Annual General Meeting of the Council will be held on 4th March 1987 at 7.30 p.m. in the Primary School. As with our usual monthly meetingthis is open to the public – so why not come along?

DISTRICT COUNCIL NEWS

CALEDON PARK.

Caledon Park is an Edinburgh-based company wishing to build on part of Portlethen Moss just south of the main slip road into Portlethen. They approached the District Council a year ago with ideas for two huge retail warehouses, each almost as big as ASDA itself. The total area of the buildings would be 120,000 square feet. Apparently Allied Carpets and MFI, the do-it-yourself people linked with ASDA were interested.

We told Caledon in meetings in February that their planning application might find more favour if it included a comprehensive leisure facility acceptable to the community. The planning application was submitted in March and expanded to include a 70-bedroom hotel.

The application was advertised and attracted only one objection – from the City of Aberdeen, concerned with competition with its own shops. On that basis Grampian Region successfully persuaded the Secretary of State for Scotland that they, the Region, should determine the application as it could have a significant impact on Aberdeen.

Most of the Summer and Autumn were spent by the Region and developers on an impact study. The study itself finally emerged in late November, and in December the Regional Officials advised their members to approve the development subject to satisfactory agreement on a number of matters including roads and leisure facilities. Both the District and Portlethen Community Councils were to be consulted before a final decision in early February.

Over Christmas and the New Year the District Officials along with myself and John Dunn from the Community Council met with the developers, who made the offer to donate £350,000 towards a leisure complex anywhere in Portlethen if that was what the community wanted. This offer was received with enthusiasm by everyone at the public meeting on January 8th. There a unanimous preference was expressed for a phased swimming pool complex to be built in a more central location, such as the empty space next to the bowling green. The Caledon Park site is the wrong place for a leisure centre and, because of its boggy nature, a swimming pool there would cost twice as much to build.

When the District Council met with the Region the following day our officials who were present at the public meeting were able to say that the clear preference was to accept the £350,000 and use it to build a swimming pool nearer the centre of Portlethen.

Having secured District Council and community support for their warehouse, hotel and leisure centre proposals Caledon Park then wrote to the Chief Executive of the District Council on January 13th withdrawing their offer of £350,000 and insisting that they want to spend the money themselves on some ill-defined facility nobody wants, on their own site.

I share the

practice. The community has been led up the garden path. I am not surprised that the Community Council feels badly let down by Caledon Park and is now opposing the whole development. Caledon Park must come up with a better proposition for Portlethen before I or the Community Council can recommend it to Grampian Region for acceptance.



LEISURE CENTRE ?

May I take this opportunity to thank all who attended and participated in the meeting in the pavilion on Thursday, 8th January.

I do not propose to dwell on the ins and outs of the Caledon Park application, suffice to say it has concentrated people's minds on the problem of leisure and sports facilities in Portlethen.

I would like to suggest that we as a community do not lose the interest and impetus which has now been raised; in fact we should be pushing for what we want even harder. We are, after all, only a few souls less than Stonehaven, and I don't need to remind you of the facilities to which they have access!! Let us look on the positive side and distill our leisure requirements, wet and dry, into sensible, constructive demands which councils, commercial operators or anyone else will find it impossible to ignore.

I am well aware that there is a strong demand locally for a pool, and I can well understand this, but let us look at this sensibly and ask ourselves the following questions: How many times a week do you or would you swim? How many lengths do you swim? Would you be prepared to donate £5 per week for five imaginary swims in our imaginary pool?

While I would be delighted to discover that we have a large undiscovered swimming group in Portlethen I somehow feel that most people fall into my own category and go to the pool for some light exercise and fun with the children. So what I am suggesting is that what we require is a fun water facility which can accommodate about fifty people at any one session but one which has a non-regular shape, underwater lighting, fun chutes, bubble curtains etc. etc.

A very important factor is that the operating costs of a fun facility are considerably less than, perhaps as much as half those of, a small 'conventional' pool, depending on usage, design, heat recovery etc.
