

PORTCULLIS -

PORT WHO?

For those of you who are regular readers of The Mearns Leader and/or the Evening Express the name Portlethen Portcullis may already be familiar. For the uninitiated however, a word or two of explanation will be required.

Portlethen Portcullis was formed at the end of May following a meeting of Portlethen & District Community Council. At this meeting some general concerns were expressed with regard to the impact which large scale planning developments could have on the community. As a result of this, a sub-committee of interested residents came into being. An initial meeting of the sub-group took place and a name which could easily be identified was chosen. Why Portcullis? In days of old the portcullis could deny entrance to the marauding hordes or admit a friendly face. While friends are always a welcome sight, it seems to us that the time has come to drop the portcullis against the continual plundering of local land for never-ending housing estates.

The need for good, quality housing is one we recognise and we have no desire to prevent developers from creating employment. However, we also recognise the very real need for Portlethen to become a community where people want to put down roots, raise a family and stay for more than just one or two years. We feel strongly that what is needed is a breathing space, time to consider the needs of the community as a whole and how best to achieve these needs. Will 300 more families seeking places in the local schools and nurseries, appointments at the Health Centre, social amenities and access to Aberdeen on an already crowded trunk road really add to your quality of life? Will it add to theirs?

Portlethen Portcullis is fighting for this breathing space on your behalf. We have already lodged a letter of objection to the current application with the Planning Authority. LOCAL UPDATE

Planning

The Scottish Office has now returned the Structure Plan with minor modifications. This makes it unlikely that the new town at Banchory-Devenick will obtain Planning Permission. The allocation of houses in Portlethen until 2001 is complete and permission has been granted for the new Health Centre.

Copies of the plan, when printed will be made available in the library. A public enquiry will have to be held on the Local Plan which will probably require some updating due to the delay.

Education

The opening of the Nursery at Newtonhill will extend the numbers of places in the Portlethen Academy catchment area. Aberdeenshire's policy of education from the cradle to the grave will enable people of all ages to reach their real potential, widen horizons and have fun.

Environment

Money for local government is still very restricted and we are monitoring carefully all environmental issues. Care must be taken not to allow children near dangerous areas such as burns, the railways etc. Councillors and officials will move immediately if alerted to any dangers but can't be everywhere.

Local amenities

A reminder for after the holidays - Community Education and the Coffee shop provides a venue and a welcome for all ages, the Bourtree Hall caters for many Under 5s. The Y.W.C.A. Coffee Mornings on Wednesdays provide a welcome for coffee and lunch and each Wednesday a different sale takes place. These include books, toys, childrens clothing etc and provides an opportunity to meet people and exchange news.

I will be holding regular surgeries and will advertise the venue in The Mearns Leader.

NATURE NOTES - THE ARMCHAIR NATURALIST

In these articles and during talks, I often bang on about wildlife gardening. There is more interest in the subject than appearances might lead a pessimist like myself to believe. I saw a splendid garden in Portlethen a few days ago while delivering a newsletter. The owner had used plenty of red campion (Silene dioicum) which, apart from being an attractive native wild flower, has a long flowering season and is also a popular food source for bees and moths. The message that I am trying to put across is that not only does this gardening serve a useful conservation purpose, it also adds an extra dimension to gardening which can give the gardener extra pleasure from his or her plot of ground. Personally I am not very good at gardening and if it were not for the enjoyment of seeing more wildlife around me, I doubt if I would do more than keep things tidy.

Late last summer, while a friend and I sat in the garden one evening discussing the affairs of the world while drinking mugs of Lapsing tea, my friend pointed out a whitethroat working its way through the cotoneaster bushes. I looked at it and thought that it looked a little strange. My friend, who was by now looking at the stranger through field-glasses, suggested that this was because the bird was a lesser whitethroat. Now I have only seen a lesser whitethroat a few times before and none of these sightings were in Scotland. We watched the bird for some thirty minutes as it flew to the hedge, working it in great detail, picking off insects from time to time, twisting its head to check the underside of leaves. The bird was still there when we left.

What is this to do with wildlife gardening? Simply that I have the only mixed broadleaf native hedge in the street and for this bird my hedge and shrubs were an oasis in a desert. It benefited from the food and cover that I provided and I benefited from being able to watch closely and in comfort, an uncommon species. Our bird would have been a passage migrant travelling between its breeding area and its wintering area in Africa.

In a small garden, one does not need to go overboard and grow only plants native to the North East of Scotland. One can also grow exotics which are classed as wildlife friendly, plants like buddleia, most of the cotoneasters, fuchsias and red valerian. Wildlife friendly gardens really do contribute to conservation and also to our own health and well-being.

Portlethen has indeed been quiet this month with many people away on holiday. All too soon the schools will be back. It is disappointing that yet another temporary classroom is to go into the Academy to accommodate the rising school roll.

Although the Scottish Office has at long last returned what was Grampian Regional Council's and now is in part Aberdeenshire Council's Structure Plan, work on the new Structure Plan should be starting again! Development Planning is an ongoing process.

The standard of ground maintenance of public areas in Portlethen has been disappointing this year with the 10% overall cutback in all service funding being compounded by the poor summer. In the drawing up of new contracts there are efficiencies to be made in what is now one council area. This will overcome the situation where previously one councils contractor cut the grass on one side of a pavement and some other contractor for the other council did the road side of the same pavement. The supervision of all work done will then be easier to monitor and be the responsibility of one supervisor. Amenity areas, paths and play areas abandoned by developers and not handed over for council maintenance are going to be targeted for action.

The council has given planning permission, subject to Scottish Office approval, for a new Group Medical Practice building and associated car park area opposite the railway station to the north of Portlethen Parish Church. This was proposed for approval although against land use policy as the alternative site in Badentoy was unacceptable in roads safety and pedestrian use policies. Overall a balanced view was taken that the site of choice was in Portlethen's best interest.

Many people are disappointed that we have been unsuccessful this year in our bid to have an International Youth Festival evening in Portlethen. Last year it was very much enjoyed and appreciated by everyone. It was spectacular. As you will be aware, this is the 25th year, organised by voluntary groups and is completely dependent on financial sponsorship and help. We need to make a bid now for next year. I am asking for company sponsorship to ensure these happy-faced, talented young people brighten up an evening in Portlethen. People of Portlethen - if you don't own a company, you might work for a big company which might be willing to act as a sponsor. Over to you. See what you can do to help the International Youth Festival to come back here and spread some happiness. I hope you all had a wonderful holiday.

Alpha


