


Our Group's Projects -Portlethen Moss and Portlethen Community Woodland

Portlethen Moss - Local Nature Conservation Site (LNCS)

With a very dry start to early summer, we were concerned about the state of the peat, but thankfully (for the peat) the rain did come. Further peatland restoration work is scheduled for autumn, an oil company is volunteering with our Ranger to both fund and carry out conservation work.

Earlier this year a cuckoo was once more heard calling on the Moss. However, thankfully for the small birds it was just passing through. Due to their recent population decline, cuckoos are now listed as globally-threatened, with big declines in breeding populations and ranges, so we are really quite honoured to have one visit our moss.

Community Woodland

Repairs were made to the main entrance off Downies Road where the fence was falling apart – thanks to Aberdeenshire Councils Landscape Services for carrying out the work.

The orchard was very productive again this year, especially the fruit bushes. With our own funds, we purchased a new battery mower that we've used to cut the grass paths in the orchard. We're going to sow some yellow rattle in the longer grassy areas to help create wildflower meadows.

We did some repair work to the most worn parts of the paths in the wood. Hopefully this will tide them over until such time as they can be fully upgraded.

The woodland is still growing and each year it amazes us as it matures and how our initial plan on a piece of paper is now the real thing.









For anyone who doesn't know, the site was a disused agricultural field until, back in March 2007, we sent a proposal to Aberdeenshire Council detailing our aspirations to create a community woodland. Thankfully our request was approved and working in partnership with Aberdeenshire Council, the first phase of tree planting was in November 2010.

New Community Garden (Garden on the Green)

Plans are ongoing in the background. At time of writing, we've just submitted an application to the Meikle Carewe Wind Farm Community Fund for funding to create a circular walkway. If successful this will kick off the project, as we need to install the walkway first.

Thanks to Greenspace Aberdeenshire, we already have some plants for the garden and we will be applying for more when the scheme opens up again. We were also successful in a funding application to The Conservation Volunteers (TCV) via The Chestnut Fund - we received £100 for plants.

Further funding will be sought going forward for seating, planters and the boundary, as a consequence it will be a work in progress for some time.

If you wish to know more about the group or if you want to become a member (new members are always very welcome), please do not hesitate to contact us through our Facebook page or at one of our events. Being a group member is neither onerous or time consuming; we have 'hands on' events throughout the year and everyone is welcome to take part. It's very rewarding, you can see the results of the work we do, and you know that you're doing something really positive for our local environment.

Saving Our Endangered Hedgehogs



By September, hedgehogs need to build up body fat prior to hibernation. Some adult males will hibernate from as early as October, females are always later as they take longer to build up fat reserves after having hoglets, often as late as September. Hoglets born late in the year (like the one above) are the ones that struggle the most; once independent of mum, some find it difficult to find food. Many gardens have had 'makeovers', leaving them as barren places with no habitat for the insects that hedgehogs need to survive, so please help them by providing wet or dry food, this can be in the form of kitten complete dry food and wet cat or dog food, with a shallow bowl of water available at all times.

If you have a hedgehog house in your garden, September is a good time to make sure its dry and clean inside. Really pack it full of fresh dust- extracted hay or barley straw (a mix of both is ideal) and leave hay close by for them to add to their nests. You'd be surprised at just how much material they can pack into a hibernation nest. It's very important to place the house in a sheltered spot where it stays dry all winter and with the entrance facing away from direct sunlight.

In autumn there's no need to worry about any hedgehog out at night that you may think looks too small, so long as its active and eating, it's always best left wild. The exception to the rule, of course, is one being out during the day or once it's well into winter. If in doubt, call a rescuer for advice and never be tempted to look after a hedgehog yourself - they're wild, endangered animals with complex needs.

Primary 6 Art Competition Winners-Links with local Businesses

Earlier this term, Amazon ran a competition for local schools to get involved and potentially win money for their school. As April was Earth Month, the competition wanted schools to create some 'treasure' /artwork out of rubbish that would otherwise be binned. The school with the best entry would win £3000 and guess what Fishermoss Primary 6 won! Amazon's Sustainability Ambassador at Portlethen's Delivery Station came to school to present the prize.

Primary 7 pupils attended Lectures for Schools held at Aberdeen University and run by The Hydrographic Society, Scotland Branch. In their 8th annual Schools Lectures they presented Surveying for the Energy Industry with talks about what surveying is, new technology and gadgets used in surveying, and talks from people who have worked offshore. The aim was to inspire young people from Primary 7 upwards to consider science subjects when they make their choices for Nat5 and beyond, and also to have fun while learning. Our Primary 7 pupils were super ambassadors for Fishermoss School at this event and stood out from the crowd for all the right reasons.

As part of the event, there was the opportunity for schools to participate in a range of poster competitions. Our Primary 7 pupils entered and did us proud by winning the following challenging briefs.....

'An oil company needs a new subsea map of their oil field to help them plan how to dismantle it. The oil field contains two platforms that are anchored to the seabed and lots of pipelines that run between the seabed well, the platforms and the shore. You have an ROV (Remotely Operated Vehicle) plus a ship, but YOU have to decide the kind of equipment you would put on your ROV to produce the new map and why you would need this equipment'.

Your school needs an updated plan of the school grounds. Your group has been asked to produce a scale map showing one part of the school buildings and surrounding areas. You will also need to describe how you created your plan, the equipment you used, the problems you found and how you solved them.'

All pupils in **Primary 5 to 7** have successfully completed their Young Emergency Aider Award Scheme First Aid Training at First Level delivered by Grampian Training Services. Our current Primary 5 and 6 pupils will build on this training, going forward to the next level. We strongly believe at Fishermoss that first-aid training is a basic life skill everyone should learn.

Fishermoss Family Community Clean Up

A total of 67 enthusiastic and jolly litter pickers turned up! A significant amount of rubbish was collected around the community, 28 large black bags altogether, weighing 40kg, along with 2 heavy metal poles and an ASDA trolley! We were encouraged by the response to this event, but many in attendance were disappointed at the amount of litter found in the community. Afterwards, there was lots of lovely chat on our front lawn over refreshments in the sunshine.....a reward for all their hard work! Great teamwork from our Fishermoss Family.

We are sadly saying farewell to Mrs Gillian Stewart, one of our teachers, who is retiring after 35 years at Fishermoss School. She very much leaves with mixed emotions as she loves teaching and could not imagine doing anything else but, mainly because of recent serious family illness, the time is right for her to stop so that she has the time and flexibility to spend with family! We wish her many happy days in her retirement and thank her for the difference she has made to so many lives over the years at Fishermoss school!

News from Cllr Mel Sullivan



It's been a rather stressful couple of months for me. I didn't quite make it to the summer holidays before 'burning out'! Thankfully common-orgarden councillors like me don't tend to have any meetings in the school holidays, so my batteries should be back at full charge by the time you read this.

It's been a challenging time for some council services too. The three-bin rollout was, I think, an overall success. Households have quickly got the hang of what goes in the orange bin now, rather than the blue bin, with the council already getting a better price for our paper and card. The change to the routes, however, was *not* a shining example of best practice! As I write this at the start of August, I believe that every household is now getting their weekly collection, but it's been a difficult transition, with drivers unfamiliar with certain areas missing whole roads.

Another challenge this summer is the verge cutting. A simple oversight in communication has meant that you might have seen grass on verges growing much higher than usual, while grass a few metres away has been mown as expected. You'll be happy to hear that, after feedback from myself and other councillors, a new system for next year has been agreed which will prevent this from happening again.

On the subject of grass cutting, you might not know that Aberdeenshire Council is working towards 10% of our greenspace being left for nature. This means a lot more 'wild' areas in towns during the summer. Communities can get involved with making these areas attractive for both wildlife and residents, through bulb and wildflower planting initiatives.

Staffing Update

Doctors

We have several changes to our clinical team. Dr Teicia Ho will be leaving us in mid-August. Dr Ho has been employed in the practice as a Career Start GP since September last year. Dr Ho will be moving away from the area.

We shall miss both Dr Hamilton and Dr Ho and wish them all the best for the future.

We welcome back Dr Dele-Salawu, previously known as Dr Adebayo. Dr Dele-Salawu joined us on 1st August and will be working 5 sessions per week.

Dr Leyla Aliyeva will also be returning to the practice in September, having successfully completed her GP training. Dr Aliyeva will be doing 4 sessions.

We also welcome Dr Aditya Mehta. Dr Mehta is our specialist registrar who will be undertaking 6 months in GP training.

Nursing Team

Diane Murray has joined our practice nursing team as a treatment room nurse having recently completed her nursing degree. You will no doubt recognise Diane as she was previously employed as a health care assistant.

Repeat Prescriptions Ordering



We will no longer be accepting requests for repeat prescriptions by telephone. This is to ensure that no dangerous errors are made when transcribing requests. It also leaves the telephone lines free for urgent matters.

Below are the options available to you for ordering your repeat prescriptions. These options are safer as there is less potential for error in processing your prescription.

- The practice provides an online repeat prescription ordering service.
 Ask the receptionist for details, or you can visit the practice website on www.portlethenmedical.co.uk where you can complete the registration form for the online service.
- Hand in the prescription re-order slip (right hand-side of your prescription) indicating the items you require. There is a post box just inside the front door of the practice.
- Post your re-order slip to the practice- marking the envelope for the attention of the prescription assistants.
- If you are on suitable stable long- term medication, you can register with your local pharmacy for serial prescriptions. This means that the practice could send a yearly prescription to your preferred pharmacy, which you could collect directly from the pharmacy every 2 months. You would no longer have to order your prescriptions from the practice. It is important to note that you must register at your preferred pharmacy and then the practice will assess whether your prescriptions are suitable for this service.

Please remember we require a minimum of 3 working days' notice before you can collect your repeat prescription from the pharmacy of your choice.

The Portlethen & District Community Council (PDCC) dissolved in 2021 and reformed in May 2023, with a clear aim to ensure the PDCC remains operational. The PDCC's role is to represent the views of the community in matters concerning the Portlethen and District area. These matters can include responding to planning application consultations, conducting local surveys on local community issues to help create/drive community action plans and finally to help organise local events (by the time you read this, the first Portlethen Market will have been held).

We have prepared a communications charter and ways of working document to introduce ourselves to the community and help you understand our approach. It's available on the Our Portlethen website and our noticeboard at ASDA.



To ensure the PDCC workload is manageable, the PDCC will focus on the core areas that drove the members to volunteer, namely updating and driving the community action plan (e.g. lack of facilities) forward and planning (ensuring the community's concerns regarding material planning considerations are raised).



Community Action Plan

The PDCC should not be confused with your Elected Councillors who have a slightly different role:

- role in challenging and scrutinising the work of the Council
- role as representative on local community groups
- constituency case work (problems and issues local people raise)
- membership of a political group, if elected on a political platform
- role with other councillors on policy or scrutiny committees

Observers are not permitted to join in with the discussion or participate in the meeting in other ways. This is different from a public meeting, which is an open forum to allow members of the public to ask questions and discuss issues with members of the governing body or of a committee, usually on a specific topic.

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





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News from your community hall.

Jubilee Hall: a Brief History

The Jubilee Hall was gifted to the inhabitants of Portlethen and surrounding lands in September 1892 by Mrs Rosa Ann Taylor, who owned the Estate of Portlethen. The hall together with the land it sits on were to be held in Trust and managed by her nominated Trustees and their successors. These trustees were known as Heritable Trustees, and a committee comprising residents of Portlethen and the surrounding lands was elected to handle day-to-day management of the hall.

The Heritable Trustees were as follows:

The local Parish Minister

The Advocate and Factor of the Estate of Portlethen, and

The tenant of the Mains of Portlethen [this being the principal farm in Portlethen].

The Jubilee Hall achieved Charitable Status on $4^{\rm th}$ July 1958 and as such the Management Committee Chairman and the Committee Members became Charity Trustees

By 1960, the situation in Portlethen had changed significantly, with the Portlethen Estate largely split up and sold off in parcels of land, building and expanding the "village". There was no longer an official known as the "Factor", so the one remaining Heritable Trustee, the local Minister, Rev. Alexander Dunn, drew up an Addendum to the original Feu Charter nominating two new Heritable Trustees:

The resident of the Farm of Mains of Portlethen, and The Secretary to the Committee of Management and his/her successor in office

Now, 63 years on, we find ourselves in a position where a further Addendum may be required. The Minister of Portlethen Parish Church, Rodolphe Blanchard-Kowal, has recently left for another church position near London. His replacement is likely to have an expanded geographical area to minister to, namely Portlethen and Newtonhill, and may well be unaware of his/her new role in the Jubilee Hall's administration.

With all this uncertainty relating to the Trust, I am writing to assure you that the Hall remains well managed and fully available for rental for one-off or regular events. Our Booking System is up and running with contact details specified opposite and overpage. Mandy Ross, our Booking Clerk, is doing a splendid job of keeping the bookings and invoices under control and our Treasurer, Alison Duncan, continues to manage our finances expertly.

We are still looking for a **Committee Secretary**. As the hall gains in popularity and we secure additional funding, we have an obligation to keep track of invoices, correspondence and other commitments and the Committee Secretary will take the lead keeping track of all this paperwork. We held our AGM on 11^{th} June, where we had an opportunity to show our appreciation for all the support provided by Rev. Rodolphe Blanchard-Kowal over the past 6 years. We also offer our thanks to Morag Cairns who has stepped down after many years of service.

PROJECTS - We continue to upgrade the hall, to widen its appeal to the entire community. We have been awarded match funding by our lovely, elected Aberdeenshire Councillors to help us with our urgent projects. We have installed security cameras at the front and rear of the hall, purchased kiddies' tables and chairs and are planning to create an external storage unit to hold items we need in the hall but don't use often. We will also need to lay a slab as part of the storage solution and need to create 4 slabbed areas at the rear of the hall on which to set our new picnic tables. If you have the necessary skills and time to assist in these projects, please do get in touch. On behalf of the Management Committee, I must express our ongoing gratitude to our local Councillors, the Meikle Carewe Windfarm Fund and the Aberdeenshire Voluntary Action Group (AVA) Wellbeing Fund who have all helped us raise significant amounts of cash to better serve our community.

Our latest venture, our Lunch Club, which caters for people in our community with complex additional needs, kicked off last month with a generous funding award of over £5000 from the local AVA through their Communities Mental Health & Wellbeing Fund. This award allowed us to purchase the specialist equipment we need as well as provide funds to cover running costs for the first 6 months. We are excited to see this club thrive. Again, if you think this is an activity you could help with, please get in touch.

RAG BAG – This is still proving popular and raises a significant cash flow to help us keep costs down at the hall. Your contributions of clothing and shoes (appropriately bagged and tied together) is much appreciated.

Finally, we are planning to install Solar Panels and Battery storage at the hall - in line with the universal need to urgently reduce our carbon footprint. We are in negotiation with the Scottish Government, which has a programme in place to support Community Halls in their endeavour to reduce utility costs and adopt green energy usage.

We have the Portlethen & District Community Council (PDCC) up and running and there is a fine group of people on the committee. I am excited for their future and what they can achieve for Portlethen and District. If you have ideas or concerns, then do get in touch with one of the committee members. They have a strong voice for planning decisions, landscaping, and any up-and-coming grants to help with projects for improving the area. Not such good news on the Chapelton School Bus, we have lost this battle now, but I will be keeping an eye on how this is going to affect children, as well as residents around Newtonhill Primary School.

I had the pleasure of visiting some of our schools for their summer concerts and prize-givings. I always leave these occasions with a huge sense of pride. I know they are not my children, but just being honoured to represent them as an elected official, gives me a great lift. There is so much exceptional talent in our schools, our future is secure. This praise is also due to the teachers who are guiding our children through their learning years - you are doing a fine job! Often, all we hear is criticism of the younger generation, due to those few who destroy our faith in them with their vandalism and rudeness, but I find that most pupils are clever, funny and exciting people. Jacqueline Crawford spoke to us about being an engineer. We thought it was good we had a woman speaking about this, as it is often associated with men. She told us engineering is about being creative and problem-solving using maths and physics. She has worked offshore and explained her job is about working with people to make sure oil and gas get out of the ground cleanly and efficiently. Key skills that Jacqueline identified in developing for a successful career are communication, problem -

solving and self-confidence.

Jilly Powell spoke to us about working in the communications team and explained how the company is creating Scotland's largest windfarm called SeaGreen. This was very inspiring as we didn't know that oil and gas companies were involved in this. The windfarm will power 1.6 million households and there are other projects like this planned for the future.

Both Jilly and Rhonda said there were lots of opportunities in TotalEnergies, and they have supported apprenticeships and interns. It was also good to hear that the company tries to help the community - we felt that we shared some of their values in trying to help others and to give back.

We really enjoyed our visit to TotalEnergies and want to thank everyone who helped to make it happen. We are looking forward to working with the company as we take forward our plans for the future.

Born in Airthrey Castle, Bridge of Allan, I spent my early years in Glasgow where my Mum had shops. In the days before decimalisation, you had to be able to count in your head as the shops had no cash registers, only a wooden cash desk.

When I joined the Royal Navy in 1970, the ability to absorb numbers led to rapid advancement and I served with 892 Squadron on the

Ark Royal, then moving on to Commando Squadrons in my later career.

Further Engineering experience was gained with Kawasaki Heavy Industries in the Middle East, where I learned to speak Arabic quite well as part of my duties and took part in the Haj on several occasions.

In 1991, I then moved to Aberdeen and worked as an Offshore Manager for several companies (including my own) spending a lot of time away from home.

After retiring, I started to drive for the Community Ambulance as a way of putting something back into the local area's needs and requirements, taking on the role of Rota Co-ordinator a short while later.

We not only help to meet the needs of the retired community, but there are lots of younger people who also require our services. We are always happy to help all ages of people who reply on our assistance to visit the Surgery and local Dentist.

As we are now back up to 5 days a week after the Pandemic, we always require new drivers to help one half-day a week AM or PM, or for ad-hoc cover for holiday relief. We invest in our drivers' abilities (after a period of driving) by putting them through a certified training course which consists of classroom work and driver assessment on the road. We are currently embarking on a funding campaign to replace our old ambulance with a newer model by the end of the year, and would welcome any donations or sponsorship towards this objective – via one-off amounts or regular direct debits, however small.

We had a busy Summer providing our vehicle, and one of our volunteer drivers, for several afternoon and evening outings including the Portlethen Young at Heart Group and some of the residents from the BRIO retirement and assisted living facility at Landale Court in Chapelton. We also loaned our ambulance to the Portlethen Bowling Club for some of their Saturday outings.

In July we once again supported the annual Chapelton of Elsick 10K race by providing marshals from our team for car parking duties. It was a well-organised and fun event and, apart from a short downpour, we managed to stay reasonably dry and enjoyed the complementary hot drinks and home bakes at the end. The 10K committee have very generously supported our Charity for the past few years and for this we are extremely grateful.
