

<u>Our Group's Projects</u> -Portlethen Moss and Portlethen Community Woodland

Portlethen Moss - Local Nature Conservation Site (LNCS)

Our Kincardine & Mearns Ranger oversaw some peatland restoration work which was carried out in autumn by an oil company who wanted to fund and volunteer for a project that created biodiversity. They did a great job and there's scope for lots more peatland restoration work which will keep our peatland 'alive'? Keeping it 'alive' helps clean our air, did you know that peat holds way more carbon than any forest can and the water that peat retains helps prevent flooding. The moss relies purely on rainwater, there is no other water source that feeds the moss.

The volunteers were so impressed by our Moss that they asked if our group had any other projects they could help with, and the good news is that they want to help create and fund our Community Wildlife & Sensory Garden near the Green (see more about this in the last section).

Community Woodland

The creation of the community woodland and memorial orchard has, without a doubt, been one of our groups biggest successes, despite some early criticism we went on to achieve our aspirations and prove the few critics wrong. The woodland has to be the most used community green space in Portlethen which gives us great pleasure.

We added more saplings to replace tree numbers lost due to ash die back, bringing our tree numbers to capacity for now. We're trialing an area of yellow rattle in the centre of the orchard to see how well it does, the plan is to create a more sustainable perennial wildflower meadow with less grass to compete with.

We've pruned the fruit bushes then mulched around them and the fruit trees for extra protection over winter and given the beech hedge a trim, so it's all set now until spring.

New Community Wildlife & Sensory Garden

As I wrote in the Moss section of this article, we've been so very fortunate to receive an offer of help from an oil company for this project. This is such a great thing for us and for the community of Portlethen.

At the time of writing (early October), we're waiting for quotes for the work to create the circular path and to install gates and fencing. The garden will not be locked, but as a request from Fishermoss Primary School, it should be safe for them to bring groups of small children for outdoor lessons without the worry of them wandering off. The gates and paths will be wide enough for wheelchairs and buggies.

We're in the process of receiving quotes from Rosehill Timber for planters, seating, and a 'structure'. Rosehill Timber built all the wooden seats etc. (not the play equipment) in the woodland and the replacement bridges on the moss. Their products are made from solid wood, are well-constructed and stand up to the elements.

Greenspace has pledged 2,000 bulbs for the garden and there will be other plants on offer nearer the planting season.

Being a group member is neither onerous nor time consuming, we have 'hands on' events throughout the year and everyone is welcome to take part. It's very rewarding, you can see the results of the work we do and you know that you're doing something really positive for our local environment.

Helping Our Endangered Hedgehogs

By December most hedgehogs will be hibernating, but there's every chance some may still be active – these will be juveniles born late in the year who are still building up fat stores to support them through hibernation and their mothers who also need to build up after raising a second late brood of hoglets.

Hedgehogs can wake from time to time throughout winter and go searching for food so it's always best (all year round) to leave a bowl of dry kitten kibble out in a feeding station where it will stay dry and a bowl of water nearby. Keep checking to see if the food is eaten and top it up, or replace it if it gets damp.

Be careful if you're planning any garden jobs, replacing new sheds or decking over winter, because there could be a hedgehog hibernating under that shed, decking, that pile of garden rubbish, inside that compost heap. If you accidentally disturb a hibernating hedgehog, cover it back over right away, leave a bowl of food and water close by so if it wakes, it finds food quickly and can hibernate again.


It's important to remember that over winter there's no need to worry about any hedgehog out at night, so long as it's uninjured, not a teeny tiny one, it's active and eating, they don't need rescuing just because its winter, they're always best left in the wild if they're healthy.

The exception to the rule, of course, is out during the day, any hedgehog out during the day in winter will always need rescuing, no matter how big or well it looks – if in doubt call a rescue for advice and never be tempted to look after a hedgehog yourself, they're wild vulnerable animals with complex needs.

Portlethen & District Men's Shed and Garden has been open to our members again since the beginning of the year. We are open to anyone who wishes to come along and see what The Shed does. Our opening hours are Monday, Wednesday, and Friday from 10am to 1pm. Check

The members continue to respond to requests from the local community. These range from garden planters, garden benches, garden furniture and other smaller items. The Shed is happy to repair or refurbish your garden furniture and other items that are within our capabilities so just let us know what you need.



The members decided to make a small quantity of wooden outdoor poppies for Remembrance Day in November. This small project ended up being a major job for the Members as over 100 poppies were requested. Our thanks to local community for supporting this project and it means that The Shed will be able to make a bigger donation to the Poppy Appeal.

The work on a request from Lethen Park Care Home for raised wheelchair accessible planters continues and the units delivered

have been planted up. The gardeners in our Shed have been enjoying the fruits of their labours too. Most of the fruit, vegetables and the potatoes have been harvested and enjoyed.

We continue to maintain links with local schools and community groups. We did some work for Bourtree Pre-School, and we also recently cleaned and painted the door of Portlethen Town Association storage unit and repaired chairs and benches and planters for the Jubilee Hall. Who are we

Mearns & Coastal Healthy Living Network is a charity established in 2002 to support the wellbeing of older people living in Kincardine & Mearns.

We focus on the things that older people themselves say are important, which support them to live independently.

We also give older people in the community the chance to build their skills and confidence by volunteering with us.

We are based in Laurencekirk, our charity is run by a small team of staff and a Board of directors.

What do we do

We provide a range of volunteer-led services and activities to support the health and wellbeing of older people (age 50+) throughout Kincardine & Mearns.

The services include help with transport to medical appointments, accompanied or home delivery shopping service, friendly phone chat and garden maintenance.

Our activities include community gardening, a lunch club, low level health walks, digital skills classes, gentle exercise classes and a social group for people with cognitive impairment.

Did you know

Celebrating its 20th year in 2022, the charity serves an area of approximately **300² miles** that is home to over **45,000 people**. It's worth noting that, being rural, this catchment area is relatively poorly served by public transport - or affordable alternatives – further increasing the potential for isolation.

Since its establishment to address these issues, MCHLN has grown from a fledgling charity to one engaging some **200 people a week**. It also coordinates a volunteer network of around **80 individuals** that recently gave over **3,000 hours** of their time for the year – the equivalent of **83 working weeks**.

Running **550** groups, classes, and activities annually, MCHLN is focussed on combating the negative effects of loneliness and isolation - as well as working against exclusions, such as digital. It focuses on the things that older people themselves say are important and regularly hosts open forums to ensure its activities are in line with the wishes of those it serves. Its activities, services and groups promote social engagement and both support and assist/enable individuals with the practical issues of day-to-day life whilst promoting inclusion, health & wellbeing and reducing loneliness and isolation. We currently have **506** registered clients - and took on 123 new clients between May '22 and Aug '23. In the period 1/5/22 to 31/6/23 our service received **1,214** requests.

What is Sepsis?

Sepsis is the body's over-reaction to an infection or injury. When the body is overwhelmed by an infection, sepsis causes the immune system to attack its own organs and tissues. It needs to be considered as a medical emergency like a heart attack or a stroke, as if it's left untreated or not caught quickly enough sepsis can cause organ failure, necrosis of body tissues which means the tissues die and need to be amputated, and eventually death. Sepsis is very quick, and can kill in under 24 hours, so it's vital that people know the signs to look out for. With early diagnosis it can be treated with antibiotics and fluids given through an IV and the outlook is often good for most patients who get urgent medical attention.

What are the symptoms?

The problem with sepsis is that there's no 'one sign' so it can be difficult to identify. If you, or a loved one, display any of the symptoms below, especially if you've got an infection, or are just really unwell, seek immediate medical advice and just ask "Could it be Sepsis?"

Common symptoms of sepsis in	Common symptoms in children are:
adults:	Very fast breathing
Slurred speech or confusion	A seizure or a 'fit'
Extreme shivering or muscle pain	Skin that's mottled, pale or slightly

blue	Abnormally cold to touch

The most crucial thing to understand is that sepsis is triggered by any infection. Some of the most common causes of sepsis in both adults and children are from urinary tract infections, chest infections, infected cuts or bites, a wound from trauma or recent surgery and infections contracted during birth. Sepsis can affect anyone at any age, regardless of how fit and healthy they are.

The Scale of Sepsis

It is estimated that over 245,000 people in the UK will develop sepsis from an infection this year which is more than double the amount of people who will present at hospital with a heart attack. Another way to understand the truly devastating scale of sepsis and its impact is to know that sepsis kills 48,000 people in the UK every year, which is more than breast, bowel and prostate cancer deaths combined. It's responsible for 1 in 5 deaths worldwide.

My Sepsis Story

At the beginning of February 2023, I was blue-lighted to hospital critically ill with a serious, unknown infection causing sepsis. I'd collapsed 3 days previously and thought I was "just anaemic", but by the time my blood results came back, and my GP admitted me to hospital, I had drastic sickness and diarrhoea, severe hearing loss, delirium with a fever over 40°C and low blood pressure. Initial blood tests in Critical Care showed a strep infection in my bloodstream so they blasted me with three broad spectrum IV antibiotics and IV fluids, continuously monitoring my vital signs while they worked hard to find where the infection was. After a long, anxious day for my husband Phil and our boys, they were allowed to see me for a short visit, but I was still deteriorating and really struggling. I have very patchy memories of what happened, but I do remember praying continuously for the strength to fight.

An emergency CT scan of my abdomen showed inflammation and infection in my pelvis and three DVT blood clots. By late that night, the Doctors said I was stable but that it could still go either way. The doctors were amazed how well my body responded to the life-saving antibiotics as the next morning I started to improve. When the blood cultures came back, they had isolated Group A Strep (iGAS) and my IV was changed to benzylpenicillin. One of the scariest parts was the hallucinations and sensory overload I experienced when my brain just wouldn't switch off and I couldn't sleep. Another day, I could hardly talk as I struggled to find words or get them out. I had episodes of low potassium and low phosphate, so these were also replaced via IV. I was in hospital for 17 days and had a PICC line fitted to administer my own IV antibiotics at home for a further four weeks. The Doctors told me that I had defied the odds and I was so thankful to have survived and not lost any limbs.

Physical Recovery from Sepsis

When I was discharged from hospital, I was so weak I could only walk a few steps and couldn't climb the stairs. Although I knew it was long road ahead, I was determined to make a full recovery. I'd received no information about how to recover apart from "you will be very, very tired for a very, very long time". Once my appetite returned, my body craved protein to rebuild all the muscle I had lost. I embarked on my physical recovery by setting mini goals, celebrating every little milestone. I celebrated my first hundred steps then slowly increased until it was 1,000 then 10,000.

After the Easter holidays I started my phased return to work at Portlethen Primary and the first day I worked three hours then went home to sleep for four hours! At the end of April, I felt well enough to return to PureGym Wellington Circle. Under the guidance of my PT (@exerciseandmentalhealthcoach), I restarted my weekly PT sessions then slowly added in weight-based classes. Although my body is still healing, I've had a good physical recovery. It's taken a lot of hard work as I've had to push myself while



listening to my body to not overdo it! Walking, weights and stretching have been my physical therapy.

Mental Recovery from Sepsis

Sepsis is also a huge trauma on the body mentally and when I got home from hospital, the emotion hit. The memory loss, night terrors, anxiety attacks, chest pains, flashbacks, nightmares, hair loss and PTSD were never mentioned in hospital. I had amazing support from my husband, our boys, family, friends and colleagues but I also needed professional support. I'm so thankful I did my own research and found The UK Sepsis Trust. Their weekly survivor zoom calls were an invaluable safe space to share my experience with those who understood and to cry the tears I'd held in while being so brave in hospital. Facing and talking about the trauma early on in recovery really helped and I can now talk about what happened without getting upset. I've focused on a positive mindset throughout my recovery as I've so much to be thankful for. Sepsis is a life-changing experience and every day I wake up grateful to be alive. I take time to appreciate the small things in life and no longer get stressed about things that don't matter.

Who are the UK Sepsis Trust?

The UK Sepsis Trust are a small team of 16. The charity was founded in 2012 by Dr. Ron Daniels, an NHS ICU clinician who was devastated by the amount of sepsis deaths he witnessed on his ward as patients were arriving too late. The charity work to save lives from sepsis and improve outcomes for survivors by educating healthcare professionals, raising public awareness and providing support for those affected by this devastating condition. The Trust offer free support groups and a free confidential support service operated by NHS sepsis nurses who work with people to empower and support them through recovery or bereavement.

Raising Awareness about Sepsis



I'm now a volunteer for the UK Sepsis Trust and my mission is to raise awareness by fundraising, continuing to talk about sepsis and telling my story. During the month of July, I walked 20,000 steps a day and raised over £1000 for the UK Sepsis Trust. In August, Phil and I held a sepsis stall at the Portlethen Gala to raise awareness by handing out leaflets and speaking to people. As part of Sepsis September, I gave a sepsis presentation to S6 at Portlethen Academy. During October, I've been supporting an American woman I met through Instagram who's just

survived iGAS and sepsis. The UK Sepsis Trust have a new 100 squats per day fundraising challenge coming up in November so I'm looking forward to that too! I'm available in December if any organisation or business would like a sepsis talk.

What can you do? Become Sepsis Savvy

It is estimated that 14,000 lives could be saved every year if people just asked, "Could it be Sepsis?" at an earlier stage and treatment could be delivered. The UK Sepsis Trust need support to invest in resources to tell the public and healthcare community about sepsis. Please go to <u>sepsistrust.org</u> to become Sepsis Savvy and tell others about it too. Schools and employers can also register for free resources and become Sepsis Savvy. You can donate to the UK Sepsis Trust via their website and any support is greatly appreciated.



Jubilee Hall: Breaking News!

Following the successful insulation of the hall roof-space last year and replacing the horrendously inefficient infra-red heating system with state-of-the-art Air Source Heat Pumps, we have decided it is now time to refurbish the hall.

When the old heaters were removed, they left a few gaping holes in the walls and the new Air Source Heat Pumps also required holes to be drilled to connect the inside heating units to the outside pumps. While the new heating system works nicely, we were painfully aware that the hall was looking a bit "tatty"! The floor has also suffered from 20 years of footfall, so a complete refurbishment is now underway.

The hall will have been closed from Friday 13^{th} October for 5 days for the floor to be sanded and revarnished. Following that work, the hall will again have been closed on 6^{th} of November, this time for a week, for all the holes to be patched and replastered and the entire hall redecorated from floor to ceiling. We are very much looking forward to the final results and I'm sure it will be a vast improvement.

Of course, we will need your assistance to keep the hall looking pristine and to help with this, a small cleaning kit will be made available to all our future Lets to allow them to clean up after their events, be it a children's party or a regular group event. We ask all our clients to brush the floor before leaving the hall and we really appreciate everyone's help in this.

We have purchased 20 new folding tables to supplement the 5 kiddies' tables and 20 kiddies' chairs we purchased over the summer. We are still planning to build 4 picnic tables on the grassy area to the rear of the hall, which can be used for barbecues and picnics over the summer months. We are also hoping to build additional storage to the side of the hall, as our growing client base often come with equipment and materials which, ideally, require to be kept at the hall for future use.



Facilities are first rate offering a well-equipped kitchen, toilets (including disabled) also baby-changing provision. Car parking is available, also provision for disabled drivers by way of a car park closer to the church. Apart from the Community Room, we also have space at the rear of the church (7 x 7.5 metres) which could be used for fitness classes such as yoga, a children's nursery, public meetings, first aid groups, concerts. There is also adequate open space at the front of the church for musicians/choirs. There is a PA system where you can play your own music and an Epson projector and screen.

My article for this quarter is about planning.

This is an area that I am passionate about, and hope that decisions I make are for the benefit of all the residents in Aberdeenshire and in particular, Ward 17 North Kincardine.

We cannot, as elected members, get into discussions on planning applications before they come in front of area committee or otherwise. That does not mean that we do not take on board comments that are sent or related to us. We do listen to residents and Community Councils when they voice their opinion, but we must keep an open mind and make a judgement on all evidence that is presented to us on the day.

As I am sure you are aware, there are many policies that must be followed in determining a planning application; some set by Aberdeenshire Council, through the Local Development Plan, and some set by Scottish Government, through the National Development Plan. They are similar in content and help to guide decisions to the best outcome for all concerned.

With policies, there can always be reasons why elected members may vote against the Planning Department's decision to Grant or Refuse an application.

So it was with the application for 175 houses to be built at Hillside, Portlethen. When all the evidence had been presented to us, by the Planning Officer, at the Area Committee meeting, and after many questions and debate on the day, Mel Sullivan, your Lib Dem Councillor put forward an amendment, which I seconded, to the decisions by the planning department to grant planning permission. The amendment was to refuse planning on the grounds that the application did not:

- 1) Allow enough usable open and green space for the development;
- 2) Look at improving infrastructure and services;

3) Answer to our satisfaction the questions on the extension to Portlethen Academy, already over capacity, to enable it to accommodate the extra pupils.

Although the plan showed 40% open space, as is required re policy, in our estimation, it was not space that children could freely play on. We are not against new development in Portlethen, but it must give existing and new residents the quality of life that they expect. For too long, Portlethen has been a collection of housing estates, with no real thought, into planning of quality of life and infrastructures, essential to a comfortable environment. It is no secret that I am campaigning for more football space, a Sports Centre / Community Centre, a more affluent entrance to Portlethen and a proper Town Centre. Some of these are ambitious, to say the least, but I believe that you must have a vision and ambition and should follow that vision/ ambition, to the best of your ability.

That is what I will be doing for as long as I am your elected representative.

I will take this opportunity to wish you all a very Happy Xmas and a Good New Year. Let's look forward with positivity to 2024 and a better life for all residents in Aberdeenshire and Scotland.

The A2B service is open to:-People who have difficulty walking People with other disabilities Residents who don't live near a bus stop or bus route.



If you think you need door-to-door transport you may qualify. We can take you anywhere within Portlethen e.g. shopping, medical centre, the library or to connect onto another bus service. You can ask for a trip at any time between 9.45 and 13.30 hrs, but you will need to fit in with other passengers. Phone us to find out more about the service. All passengers have to be registered as an A2B member.

All trips must be pre-booked. Bookings can be made up to 7 days in advance, or up to 14 days for a medical appointment.


