



Portlethen Medical Centre News Update



Future plans for Portlethen Medical Centre

General practice in Scotland is currently in crisis. There is a UK shortage of GPs which is even more evident in the North East of Scotland. While we are fortunate that we have avoided the worst of these problems, we are aware that there is currently longer to wait for a routine appointment than we would like. We also know that you can wait for a long period on the telephone to get through to speak to someone.

In order to improve access, we are working on a digital access system so that we can combine the best of new digital technology with traditional GP practice. This means that all contacts requesting an appointment with the practice will be triaged by a clinician. We will continue to be accessible by telephone for those that cannot use or access digital technology.

We have also appointed a new partner who will be joining the team in April 2024. We are also planning to appoint additional clinical staff later in the year to further enhance our team.

The plans for our new service are still in development however we want to ensure you are informed of our planned positive changes for the future. Please keep an eye on our Facebook page, practice website and information within the surgery for progress reports on the proposed changes.

Management change

Our Practice Manager retired from her post on 8^{th} February 2024. Mrs Roberta Ross, previously our assistant manager, took up the Practice Manager post on Monday 12^{th} February.

<u>Portlethen Moss, Portlethen Community Woodland</u> <u>& Community Wildlife & Sensory Garden</u>

Climate Week North East 2024 15th - 24th March

Portlethen Moss - Local Nature Conservation Site (LNCS)

The wet winter has been beneficial in raising water levels keeping the sphagnum mosses wet and the peatland alive. Sphagnum mosses can hold up to 8 times their weight in water and without them peatlands would not exist.

Sphagnum mosses play a vital role in the creation of peatlands, by storing water in their spongy forms they prevent the decay of dead plant materials which eventually forms peat. Peat forms at an incredibly slow rate, on average 1mm a year, it takes a staggering 1,000 years for one metre of peat to form.

Did you know that healthy peatlands can store up to 30 times more carbon per hectare than a healthy tropical rainforest?

This is why it's so vital for us to conserve what's left of our own peatland - Portlethen Moss Local Nature Conservation Site.

As part of Climate Week North East, Portlethen Library requested a representative from our group to give a talk about the moss - check out ours and the library Facebook pages for the date.

Community Woodland

On the theme of Climate North East Week, our group has been acknowledged for the work we've carried out to increase biodiversity and create habitat for declining pollinators in the woodland and as a result a representative from our group has been invited to take part in the Climate Week North East NESBiP's 2024 Seminar at the James Hutton Institute in Aberdeen,

New Community Wildlife & Sensory Garden

We planted around 3,000 bulbs back in December (see photo). The ground was very wet after all the rain, but we managed to get them all planted in under 2 hours.

As I write several substantial wooden features are in production for the site, these include a tactile notice board, 2 park benches, 3 wooden seating benches for children in the story corner, a picnic table with benches and 2 planters.

Lots of plants have been ordered and a small free tree pack is coming to us from The Woodland

Trust, these will all be planted in March. We're looking forward to seeing the garden develop over 2024 and like our woodland it will improve year on year as it matures.

If you wish to know more about the group or if you want to become a member (new members are always very welcome) please do not hesitate to contact us through our Facebook page or at one of our events. Being a group member is neither onerous nor time consuming, we have 'hands on' events throughout the year that everyone is welcome to take part in. It's very rewarding, you can see the results of the work we do, and you know that you're doing something really positive for our local environment.

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Helping Our Endangered Hedgehogs

If it's mild enough some hedgehogs will be out of hibernation by mid-February. These are usually the large males, who will have been hibernating since October, followed over the next few months by the females and young hedgehogs born late last year. Having lost around 25% of their body weight during hibernation, there's an urgent need for them to drink and eat. This is where the food and water we provide is lifesaving when natural food is scarce.

A hedgehogs 'preferred' natural diet is mainly beetles, caterpillars, and grubs, none of these are intermediate hosts for internal parasites. Sadly, tidy gardens don't offer sufficient habitat for these insects and hedgehogs are often forced to fill up on worms, slugs, and snails. While these foods make up a smaller proportion of their natural diet they are hosts for internal parasites and a hedgehog's natural immunity will become overwhelmed and unable to cope if they eat too many.

This is where you can help them by providing some 'good food', wet or dry cat or dog food (preferably kitten/puppy) is all they need, and a shallow bowl of fresh water — be wary of foods sold as hedgehog food, unlike pet foods, they're unregulated and can contain low value ingredients that are harmful to hedgehogs.

Providing supplementary foods (cat or dog food) complements their natural diet and helps them to stay healthy, plus you get the honour of seeing them visit your garden and in return they will keep garden pests under control for you.

Over the next couple of months, some hedgehogs can really struggle, hibernation takes its toll and any hedgehog that wasn't in tip top condition prior to hibernating, if it survives, will emerge in a very poor state. These hedgehogs are the ones that will be out during the day – as they're nocturnal animals out in the day at this time of year, no matter how well it may appear, is a sure sign that it's very poorly and its body will quickly shut down. If you see one out in the

hours of daylight you need to act fast, wear gloves to gently lift it, put it in a high sided box, keep it in a warm quiet place and call a rescue right away. Don't wait for a day or two, by then it will be too late to save it. Never try to treat or look after a hedgehog yourself - treatments for our pets are very often fatal to hedgehogs.

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


The group meet on a Tuesday morning and are currently enjoying winter activities, with the hope of starting back at the station in early spring. Get in touch if you wish to find out more.

It has been lovely welcoming our pupils back and hearing their stories of the Christmas holidays. There is a buzz of learning around our classes and lots of chat about new projects and challenges.

Anti-Bullying Ambassadors

Hillside School have a very active group of Pupil representatives called the 'Anti Bullying Ambassadors' and they do a wonderful job of raising awareness of anti-bullying issues and supporting our school to become a supportive and inclusive environment.

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

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<u>Aberdeenshire Coastal Path</u> –

Joining Communities; by Communities; for Communities

There is a plan to develop a coastal path from the River North Esk near St Cyrus along the 90 or so miles of rugged Aberdeenshire coastline to Cullen just inside Moray. It was originally conceived as a celebration of the late Queen's Platinum Jubilee and the plan has the backing of the Lords Lieutenant as well as Aberdeenshire and the City of Aberdeen Councils and a number of other stakeholders. Funding will come from a variety of sources including, we anticipate, the Crown Estate (coastal community projects funded by, among others, the offshore wind farms), the Lottery and various other sources.

Our Kincardineshire coastline is full of wonderful scenery with steep cliffs, secluded coves and



abundant wildlife including two wildlife reserves. It has a rich cultural history with castles of national significance and WWII defences through to smugglers' paths and numerous fishing stations. There is a rich and complex geology with the Highland Boundary Fault meeting the sea near Stonehaven, geologically dividing the Lowlands and the Highlands. And, of course, the route will provide a walking link between all the coastal communities to be enjoyed by visitors and locals, casual strollers and keen walkers (although it is not intended as a bike path or bridleway).

There are three main elements of the project: to establish the route; to engage with the coastal communities to inform, hear concerns and seek volunteers and information; and to establish a Trust which will oversee the future development and management of the whole path. Essentially, however, the path is a community focused project with the development and maintenance of the path being made possible by people from the coastal communities.

Our intention is for the majority of the path to be trodden grass with gates, steps, and bridges with gravel or tarmac being used only where already established. Sustainability will underpin the development and management of the path: sustainably-sourced materials for gates and bridges; recycled materials for signage, benches etc; the responsibilities of the Scottish Outdoor Access Code and Leave no Trace to the fore.

In time, we intend that the path will offer a holistic experience and opportunity with the health and leisure benefits of the path being supplemented by cultural, historic, environmental and geographical information through the use of interpretation boards; economic opportunities for existing and potential coastal businesses; educational, conservation and volunteering activities.

Our small group, MerCHAT (Mearns Coastal Heritage Trail), was responsible for opening up the route between the St Cyrus Nature Reserve and Johnshaven - quite a challenging section due to ongoing coastal erosion - and was approached to extend our operation as far as Cove. Funding for this work has come from Macphie's of Glenbervie. There is another group, funded by Aberdeenshire Council, which is developing the route from the north of Aberdeen to Cullen.

MerCHAT has been working on this (part time!) since May 2022 and has so far surveyed about 90% of the proposed route from Angus to Cove. We have photographed and noted virtually every stretch in detail and are writing up reports to share with landowners. We have visited a great many (but not yet all) the landowners to discuss plans, to hear concerns, to offer solutions. And we have attended meetings of several Community Councils along this stretch again to share plans, discuss concerns, and recruit local volunteers as well as produce a quarterly Update (see opposite for details)

As suggested, this project is a community focused project and we are always looking for potential volunteers. Should you be interested in any of the following, please contact us via the email address below: Path Ranger (regular inspections of "your section"); path maintenance - perhaps learn to use a scythe; researching local history, geography, wildlife for interpretation boards; "behind the scenes" like writing Updates and Guides, helping with sourcing fund streams. It would be great if we could say that this Coastal Path is truly a coastal community achievement.

My speech at the Press and Journal Arena as part of the Scottish National Party Conference

On Sunday 15th October, I went with my mum to the Aberdeen P&J Arena to give a talk on my experience of living with autism as part of a small event at the Scottish National Party Conference. I was invited to give a speech by the Communications Manager of the National Autistic Society, Suzi Martin, and by our local MSP, Audrey Nicoll, because I have been working tirelessly and



hard to get our own area to be more autism-friendly. They said if we went to this event, my talk would highlight why we need things to be more autism-friendly in our area.

After collecting our official conference lanyard passes, we were met by Rob Holland, Managing Director of the National Autistic Society Scotland. We were shown to the room, enjoyed a lovely spread of food, and chatted before the serious work got started.

Our event was opened by Kelly Given, the Scotland National Autistic Society Chairperson, who spoke about why we need to promote autism in a good way so that things can improve across Scotland. Then it was my turn to give a speech about my experience of living with autism. I spoke calmly and clearly, remembered to follow the order of my speech, and managed to look at the audience when I was speaking, adding some funny stories to my speech, which got a great reaction from the audience! Heather from Enable then spoke about her experience of living with a disability. Unfortunately for me, I couldn't manage to hear the whole speech because the P&J Arena is close to the airport and an aeroplane flew over at that time, and this as well as the room having buzzing noises, caused me to feel upset by the noise and sensory overload. I had to be excused and missed some of the speech. Luckily, I was able to find some quiet space in the big corridor. I was grateful my speech was first, because this did not happen then, and I was able to deliver my speech with no issues.

Next, Suzi Martin spoke about why we needed a new autism commissioner and more people with autism shaping Scotland's future. Lastly, Maree Todd, Minister for Social Care, gave a short speech on how the Scottish Government is hoping to employ an official autism commissioner.

We stopped to answer audience questions and took pictures to promote our work on social media. Right at the very end, I was lucky because Rob Holland and Suzi Martin presented me with a lovely certificate to thank me for my speech. Then I met our own MSP Audrey Nicoll and, although she had been very busy, she expressed how proud of me she was. She introduced me to Emma Roddick who is the current MSP for equalities, and we chatted in the foyer in a quiet space about all my work and how we might collaborate in the future on disability rights work.

After that I headed downstairs to visit all the exhibitors. The one that meant the most to me, and from which I received a very warm welcome, was the official disability party section of the Scottish National Party. I met its members so that I could then officially join it and get my say in how disability can work together with the wider Scottish National Party. I also visited First Bus Aberdeen, and went inside the new bus which is hydrogen-based. I had my picture taken inside the bus and I was given free stuff. Then I picked up an official party conference brochure and when I opened it up, I was overcome with happiness because my name was featured inside it!

This was the biggest thing that has happened to me, and I am so grateful for this opportunity to share my lived experience on autism. I hope I reached out to the right people and that we can all work together in the future to make autism in a positive light.

We look forward to another year of celebration and growth, of building relationships and, unfortunately for some of us, there will be challenges, financial worries, and loneliness. The Jubilee Hall is here to host your celebrations, provide opportunities to get out and get some exercise, offer a safe warm space to meet new people, make new friends and share your experience with others.

In 2023, we completed a redecoration of the hall - no more holes and peeling paintwork. We sanded and recoated the floor with a

beautiful clear varnish and upgraded the heating system to allow remote control and monitoring. We held a

successful Open Day and have seen a significant uptick in bookings and enquiries. We are taking bookings now for parties planned in the summer and beyond.

If you have a significant anniversary or event coming up, why not book the hall? We have tables and chairs for adults and children,

enough space for a bouncy castle, and *Children's tables* facilities for food preparation.

If you haven't seen the hall since the upgrade, why not drop in for a tea or coffee and a piece of home-made cake on a Wednesday morning between 10 o'clock and noon, when the Fine Piece Café will be in full swing!

We are seeking funding for a few additional improvements. We planned to install a storage unit outside the hall, but we are having trouble getting the concrete slab laid. To work around the issue, we have identified an alternative solution involving the refurbishment of two rooms upstairs inside the hall. These two rooms, when upgraded, could be hired out as small meeting rooms, providing another potential income stream, or simply shelved out for storage.

In the past few days, we have received an Engineering Assessment, commissioned by Business Energy Scotland, supporting the installation of Solar Panels and Battery Storage. This equipment, when up and running, promises to cut our utility bills by around £3000 per year and reduce our carbon footprint to close to zero. We are excited about this development and hope to receive funding from the Scottish Government as part of their planned Target Zero initiative. Installation of the panels and battery storage is planned for the summer.

The hall is managed by a dedicated team of volunteers, with a wide range of age and experience. All of us share a desire to see the local community flourish and they give up their time to help provide a safe place for you all to get together to enjoy yourselves. If you feel you can help, please get in touch.

We receive surplus fruit and vegetables weekly from FareShare and organic vegetables, when they are in season, from the farm at Bridge of Muchalls, through the @oneseedforward organisation. These items are for EVERYONE to benefit from, for a small donation, if you can.

In addition, we SELL fresh farm eggs, soup packs and bananas at a fair price. The Fareshare items are excess stock items donated by supermarkets and are distributed to us to stop them from being sent to landfill and prevent food waste. Please see our Facebook page for weekly updates on the food items donated or pop in to see for yourself. All monetary donations are then used to purchase fresh items weekly. We can accept cash or card donations.

The Larder is open **Monday 6pm-8pm**, **Friday 2.30pm-4.30pm and Saturday 10am-12pm**. Our volunteers are there to help anyone during this cost-of-living crisis and you do NOT need a referral from another organisation.

We are very grateful for any donations, large or small, as this enables us to spend our grant money and donated money on fresh items that we need to purchase. The residents, schools, churches, and businesses of Portlethen & surrounding areas are so amazing with all the support they give to us. Our wonderful and dedicated volunteers need a special mention too. We could not provide this service without everyone's help, so a huge thank you to our community!

News from Cllr Mel Sullivan



New year and lots of changes afoot – some good and some not so much. Budgets are squeezed again

this year – council tax is frozen, and some compensation will be coming from the Scottish Government, but otherwise we have less money coming in for services and for vital infrastructure works.

The three-bin rollout across the whole of the shire is almost finished. Hopefully everyone is up to speed on what goes in the blue bin now and what goes to the orange bin. These bins are quite light, so if you have a problem on windy bin days, you can get free bin straps from Portlethen HRC (recycling centre). If you can't manage to get there, please let me know and I can drop some off. Speaking of the HRC, you no longer need to pre-book a slot at Portlethen if you are using a domestic vehicle.

Out of School Care (OOSC) is ceasing to be a council-run service at the end of the school year, which will affect the Portlethen Out Of School Club. Talks are ongoing with private providers to take over, and there is also the opportunity for a parent-run group to step in. I have put a lot of information on this on my website.

Live Life Aberdeenshire has a new membership model. As well as that, if you are an Essentials member (this is free for all Aberdeenshire residents), you will now get a **free** session of a highlighted sport or activity every month.

The pavement parking ban has now come into force. Unless the road is specifically exempt (there will be signs up), then you can no longer have any part of your car parked on a pavement. This applies to blue badge holders, but not to emergency services or in a few other circumstances. To find out more, or to request a road be considered for an exemption, please search 'pavement parking' on the Aberdeenshire Council website.

I'd like to thank all the members of our community who take an active interest in making our area a better place to live. The Town Association for doing the 'fun stuff' like Christmas lights, the PDCC for sticking with it through their growing pains, the Moss/Woodland group for giving us such lovely places to enjoy nature in, all those community volunteers and Scouts who planted thousands of bulbs last autumn, and many, many more folk who give their time and effort.

Councillor Catherine Victor

Here we are, Xmas gone and New Year as far away as ever again. I love this time of year though, it's all about looking to the future with anticipation as the spring bulbs peep their heads through the ground in the promise of a bright, colourful, and beautiful spring. Whether we get that remains to be seen.

We have had a few important decisions coming in front of us in the past three months. None more important than the future of Findon Park. This came before the K & M Area committee and, although I put forward an amendment against the change of use from recreation to residential, I lost to the motion from planning by 6 votes to 4 with one abstention and one non-appearance. That was a close vote, and it is now due to come in front of Full Council where all 70 elected Councillors will decide its future, that is if the application is not withdrawn in the meantime. We will have to wait and see but be assured I will listen carefully to arguments on both sides before I decide the best way forward for the community of Findon and Portlethen. That will always be my priority.

Our latest debate has been on the Out of School Clubs that the Council provided. Approx. 365 children attended these clubs in 15 different areas of Aberdeenshire. Unfortunately, these clubs, for whatever reason, were running at a loss. My own thought on that was; why? Why couldn't we provide this service at cost? If the private sector can make a profit on providing this service, why can't the Council break even? The other problem was communication, many of the parents were not consulted, so had not been able to put forward any ideas on how the service could be provided in a better way. The SNP opposition put forward their concerns on the hardship that the withdrawal of the service would bring to many families, especially single parents and parents living in more remote places. These were voted against by the admin group at the Education and Childrens Committee meeting on Thursday 1st February. The service will be withdrawn in July. I do hope that all those affected will find a solution and for those in North Kincardine, let me know if I can help.

I also need to apologise to any of my constituents that I may have offended by my post on the PDCC Facebook page last month. I have since found out that

many of you were not aware of the LLA meeting and survey called and held in the Academy on Monday 22ndJanuary. I have now informed them of that fact and expect a much better form of communication to the public for their next planned meeting in April. I will see a lot of you there, I'm sure.

Participatory Budgeting-Success Story for Fishermoss Primary 6 and Primary 7 Pupils!

Aberdeenshire Council commissioned Young Scot to manage an online vote for a participatory budgeting exercise. This was branded as the 'We Decide... Children and Young People Voting for Change event'. Schools were asked to consider the participatory budget theme of **Climate Change & Sustainability.**

Aberdeenshire Primary Schools were encouraged to involve their Primary 6 & Primary 7 pupils to come up with exciting project ideas and apply for funding. Fishermoss Senior Pupils' project was to secure funding to equip our school with bikes and helmets and supporting tools and equipment to maintain them. These would be available for use during school time but also beyond the school day, to encourage family bike rides, peer bike rides and build on skills from previous Bikeability sessions. Having bikes will allow us to build on our Eco Schools journey and the vision of a safer, more carbon friendly environment by promoting using bikes. We believe that every child should have access to a bike,

not just for the obvious physical and environmental benefits, but also the impact it can have on improving mental health. Cycling allows us to enjoy our beautiful surroundings and to encourage carbon reduction. Our senior pupils have successfully secured £2000 for their project! We are proud of their efforts to secure these funds for their school.



Fishermoss Teaming Up with Banchory Devenick Book Project!

Primary 1, Primary 1/2 & Primary 2 have teamed up with Banchory Devenick School to have stories read to them by their senior pupils. The school emails a short video of a story on a monthly basis and our classes send comments back. Although this article brings sad news of the untimely death of John Godsman, our Maintenance Coordinator, following a tragic accident, we are celebrating all the work he has done for our community and his involvement in the purchasing of our new Ambulance. From all the tributes we have read and heard, everyone said, "John always had a smile on his face"

and I'm sure all the passengers who travelled to their appointments with John behind the wheel will agree. He will be missed very much by us all, however his legacy lives on in the people who have benefitted by the donation of his organs.

John had an illustrious career in Engineering, which took him and his family to all corners of the world over several years. When he returned to his hometown of Stonehaven, it was John's sister-in-law Lyn King, the Practice Manager at Portlethen Medical Centre, who encouraged him to volunteer as a driver for the Community Ambulance. He first became a relief driver in 2016 and, before long, had volunteered to carry out maintenance on the vehicle when required. At the AGM in 2019, John was voted onto the committee as the Maintenance Coordinator where he made sure the regular servicing, MOT and 6-monthly tail lift inspections were scheduled. Every month he would take the vehicle down to his home in Stonehaven and thoroughly clean it and top-up the AdBlue. If anything went wrong or needed replacing, all we had to do was call John and he would sort things out at short notice. If he was not available, as he and his wife Sheila enjoyed many holidays abroad, he always knew someone who could help.

As you will see below, we took delivery of our new Ambulance in the first week of February, and it was John who finalised the specifications and was in regular contact with the vehicle supplier, ensuring all the fine details were communicated clearly and the internal fitting-out was on schedule. It is down to John that we now have the vehicle that exactly meets our requirements.

On a cheerier note, our new "Wee Blue" Ambulance arrived in the first week of February and has been on the road ever since. We would not have been able to purchase this vehicle without the generosity of some local businesses, community councils and individuals.

Our thanks go to Brio Retirement Living, Kepak McIntosh Donald, Macphie of

Glenbervie, Michies Chemist and Meikle Carewe Wind Farm. The individuals who provided donations were local businessmen Colin Lawson and Graham Thom. From the local communities we received funds from Newtonhill Common Good Fund, Newtonhill Community Council, Portlethen Town Association, and lastly a grant from Aberdeenshire Council. Our thanks and gratitude go to all those mentioned above and to those who have regularly topped up our collection tins and left donations at the Medical Centre for us.

Twenty-One Local Groups Benefit from Wind Farm Community Benefit Fund

In November 2023, funding worth a total of £36,599.30 was awarded to a range of local groups and projects in the area of benefit of the Meikle Carewe Wind Farm Benefit Community Fund.

RES, a leading independent renewable energy company, operates the Meikle Carewe Windfarm Community Benefit Fund to support local groups and projects. Funding is available for the benefit of not-for-profit groups and organisations in the Community Council areas of Crathes, Drumoak & Durris, Newtonhill, Muchalls & Cammachmore, North Kincardine Rural, Portlethen & District and Stonehaven & District.
