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Newtonhill, Muchalls & Cammachmore Community Council Update

Burnside Bridge

We have started to explore various possibilities for a replacement for this bridge, which was demolished last autumn. The council has not placed the bridge on its top 20 list of bridges as it is not seen as an essential community link, despite homes being isolated and walking and cycling routes affected.

Our initial research suggests that a replacement vehicular bridge would cost around £80,000, while a temporary bridge for walkers and cyclists would be around £10,000.

We are currently exploring aspects of the project such as planning and fundraising requirements, maintenance and insurance liabilities and what help Aberdeenshire Council will offer.

Torc Torrance has been co-opted as a member of the community council dealing mainly with this issue.

Viewing telescope

We are hoping that the new viewing binoculars can be installed in March, once the weather and ground conditions improve sufficiently for the concrete work to be undertaken. The telescope will be sited near the Isabella statue.

Emergency Packs Funding

We've now received funding from the SSEN Resilient Communities Fund to make up resilience packs for people, especially the elderly and vulnerable, who find themselves without power for prolonged periods in extreme weather. Currently we are purchasing supplies and working out the best ways of storing and distributing the packs. This winter has made it clear that extreme weather is only going to become more common in years to come, so we hope to help the community become more resilient.

New housing or not?

During 2024, the Community Council will be considering a number of important issues that we will put forward for inclusion in the next Local Development Plan (LDP). A major role of the LDP is the allocation of land for building new houses. Since the start of development at Chapelton, the Community Council has opposed all new development in Newtonhill, Muchalls and Cammachmore, although sometimes Aberdeenshire Councillors have voted against the wishes of the local residents. Recent changes to legislation have given the Community Council more say in the next LDP and we intend to maintain the position of no building land allocations within the Community Council area. We would like to hear from you as to whether you support or oppose this position. If you think building land should be allocated, then where should it be? 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Newtonhill & Portlethen 50+ Walking Group



The Newtonhill & Portlethen 50+ walking was formed some 30 years ago, originally as two separate groups but combined in 2022. The group is part of the larger Grampian 50+ Network whose primary aim is to encourage people to get outside for a bit of exercise and a blether in the fresh air and beautiful countryside which surrounds us.

The group meets each Monday at 09:30, alternating between Portlethen and Newtonhill and we car share from there to our chosen destination. Our walks vary from around 6 to 8 miles and are generally on well defined tracks, though these can occasionally be muddy! Our destinations are often local in the Winter months but as the days lengthen and warm we'll travel further afield, up to around 40 miles from Portlethen / Newtonhill. Last years walks ranged from Inverurie to the North, Ballater to the West and Glen Esk to the South.

The group is very friendly and sociable, there's a steady stream of conversations on wide ranging topics going on as we walk and you find yourself chatting with different group members throughout the day. Generally there'll be around 10 -12 on a walk and its quite a relaxed pace, we'll stop if there's something interesting to look at or a fine view to take in. There's always a stop for lunch around the half way point of our walks and if we do happen to end up close to a coffee shop at walks end its not unheard of for us to indulge in an afternoon cake!



<u>Aberdeenshire Coastal Path –</u> joining Communities; by Communities; for Communities

There is a plan to develop a coastal path from the River North Esk near St Cyrus along the 90 or so miles of rugged Aberdeenshire coastline to Cullen just inside Moray. It was originally conceived as a celebration of the late Queen's Platinum Jubilee and the plan has the backing of the Lords Lieutenant as well as Aberdeenshire and the City of Aberdeen Councils and a number of other stakeholders. Funding will come from a variety of sources including, we anticipate, the Crown Estate (coastal community projects funded by, among others, the offshore wind farms), the Lottery and various other sources.

Our Kincardineshire coastline is full of wonderful scenery with steep cliffs, secluded coves and abundant wildlife including two wildlife reserves. It has a rich cultural history with castles of national significance and WWII defences through to smugglers' paths and numerous fishing stations. There is a rich and complex geology with the Highland Boundary Fault meeting the sea near Stonehaven, geologically dividing the Lowlands and the Highlands. And, of course, the route will provide a walking link between all the coastal communities to be enjoyed by visitors and locals, casual strollers and keen walkers (although it is not intended as a bike path or bridleway).



There are three main elements of the project: to establish the route; to engage with the coastal communities to inform, hear concerns and seek volunteers and information; and to establish a Trust which will oversee the future development and management of the whole path. Essentially, however, the path is a community focused project with the development and maintenance of the path being made possible by people from the coastal communities.

Our intention is for the majority of the path to be trodden grass with gates, steps and bridges with gravel or tarmac being used only where already established. Sustainability will underpin the development and management of the path: sustainably sourced materials for gates and bridges; recycled materials for signage, benches etc; the responsibilities of the Scottish Outdoor Access Code and Leave no Trace to the fore.

In time, we intend that the path will offer a holistic experience and opportunity with the health and leisure benefits of the path being supplemented by cultural, historic, environmental and geographical information through the use of interpretation boards; economic opportunities for existing and potential coastal businesses; educational, conservation and volunteering activities.

Our small group, MerCHAT (Mearns Coastal Heritage Trail), was responsible for opening up the route between the St Cyrus Nature Reserve and Johnshaven - quite a challenging section due to ongoing coastal erosion - and was approached to extend our operation as far as Cove. Funding for this work has come from Macphie's of Glenbervie. There is another group, funded by Aberdeenshire Council, which is developing the route from the north of Aberdeen to Cullen.

MerCHAT has been working on this (part time!) since May 2022 and has so far surveyed about 90% of the proposed route from Angus to Cove. We have photographed and noted virtually every stretch in detail and are writing up reports to share with landowners. We have visited a great many (but not yet all) the landowners to discuss plans, to hear concerns, to offer solutions. And we have attended meetings of several Community Councils along this stretch again to share plans, discuss concerns and recruit local volunteers as well as produce a quarterly Update (see below for details)

As suggested, this project is a community focused project and we are always looking for potential volunteers. Should you be interested in any of the following, please contact us via the email address below: Path Ranger (regular inspections of "your section"); path maintenance - perhaps learn to use a scythe; researching local history, geography, wildlife for interpretation boards; "behind the scenes" like writing Updates and Guides, helping with sourcing fund streams. It would be great if we could say that this Coastal Path is truly a coastal community achievement.

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News from Cllr Mel Sullivan

New year and lots of changes afoot – some good and some so not much. Budgets are squeezed again this year – council tax is frozen and some compensation will be coming from the Scottish Government, but otherwise we have less money coming in for services and for vital infrastructure works.

The three bin rollout across the whole of the shire is almost finished. Hopefully everyone is up to speed on what goes in the blue bin now and what goes to the orange bin. These bins are quite light, so if you have a problem on windy bin days, you can get free bin straps from Portlethen HRC (recycling centre). If you can't manage to get there, please let me know and I can drop some off. Speaking of the HRC, you no longer need to pre-book a slot at Portlethen if you are using a domestic vehicle.

Live Life Aberdeenshire has a new membership model. As well as that, if you are an Essentials member (this is free for all Aberdeenshire residents), you will now get a **free** session of a highlighted sport or activity every month.

Disappointing news about the Elsick/Burnside Bridge replacement. The route wasn't classed as 'important', meaning the bridge currently sits at number 28 on list for repair/replacement. As we have some very expensive bridges (Banff and Aboyne) at the top of the list, there is no way the funding will stretch far enough in the next year. I attended the first meeting of the campaign to get a replacement, and hopefully provided a good overview of the situation and the routes open to the community (pun not intended).

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1st Muchalls and Newtonhill Scout Group

We are 1st Muchalls Newtonhill Scout Group, started in 1975. We work towards helping young people enjoy new adventures, experience the outdoors, interact positively with others, gain confidence and have the opportunity to reach their full potential.

We achieve this through a mix of weekly sessions and occasional events like camps, district competitions and challenging activities. The biggest part of scouting in any section is the badges and awards they gain. These play a strong role in the sense of achievement each child experiences. All badges are earned through hard work, not simple attendance, and may require some work to be done at home. However we recognise that not all children have the same abilities so we adapt the requirements so that all those who participate face a similar degree of challenge.

Our group is made up of the following sections who typically meet at the Bettridge Centre:

Our leaders put in a tremendous amount of energy organising activities, here are examples of recent events. Our Cubs enjoyed an indoor Scottish themed camp in January leading the way that nights away adventures are not just for summer months. In December we took all sections to the Bettridge Centre Panto, this is free to members and is covered by our fundraising activities.

Our groups have all camped over the last year. Beavers joined the District Damboree last May at the Jock Neish Scouting Centre. Cubs camped at Templars Park last July with both leaders gaining their nights away permit. Scouts, Cubs and Beavers all camped at a joint Group Camp last September organised by Inverbervie Scouts.

Badges and activities covered by sections this year cover things like First Aid, navigation, knots, pioneering, adventure sports, frisbee golf, visits from the Aberdeenshire Ranger to learn about the Countryside Code, trees and mini beasts, hikes, gardening, bug hotels, litter picks, visits from people in our community of different faiths to learn about religions and their festivals.

Keeping our group running requires a lot of time from our volunteers. We have section leaders and assistant leaders. We have a full committee to support our leaders and help raise funds. We have 3 young leaders aged between 15 and 17 who volunteer their time and gain life skills. We have parent helpers and volunteers from our community who give time for specific badges and activities, for example members of The Chapelton Allotment Association hosted our Cubs at their allotments to complete their Gardeners Badge.

We are looking forward to an adventure packed 2024. The Fareshare items are excess stock items donated by supermarkets and are distributed to us to stop them from being sent to landfill and prevent food waste. Please see our Facebook page for weekly updates on the food items donated or pop in to see for yourself. All monetary donations are then used to purchase fresh items weekly. We can accept cash or card donations.

The Larder is open **Monday 6pm-8pm, Friday 2.30pm-4.30pm and Saturday 10am-12pm.** Our volunteers are there to help anyone during this cost-of-living crisis and you do NOT need a referral from another organisation.

JOHN GODSMAN



Although this article brings sad news of the untimely death of John Godsman, our Maintenance Co-ordinator, following a tragic accident, we are celebrating all the work he has done for our community and his involvement in the purchasing of our new Ambulance. From all the tributes we have read and heard, everyone said "John always had a smile on his face" and I'm sure all the passengers who travelled to their appointments with John behind the wheel will agree. He will be missed very much by us all, however his legacy lives on in the people who have benefitted by the donation of his organs.

John had an illustrious career in Engineering which took him and his family to all corners of the world over several years. When he returned to his hometown of Stonehaven, it was John's sister-in-law Lyn King, the Practice Manager at Portlethen Medical Centre, who encouraged him to volunteer as a driver for the Community Ambulance. He first became a relief driver in 2016 and, before long, had volunteered to carry out maintenance on the vehicle when required. At the AGM in 2019, John was voted onto the committee as the Maintenance Co-ordinator where he made sure the regular servicing, MOT and 6-monthly tail lift inspections were scheduled. Every month he would take the vehicle down to his home in Stonehaven and thoroughly clean it and top-up the AdBlue. If anything went wrong or needed replacing, all we had to do was call John and he would sort things out at short notice. If he was not available, as he and his wife Sheila enjoyed many holidays abroad, he always knew someone who could help.

As you will see below, we took delivery of our new Ambulance in the first week of February, and it was John who finalised the specifications and was in regular contact with the vehicle supplier, ensuring all the fine details were communicated clearly and the internal fitting-out was on schedule. It is down to John that we now have the vehicle that exactly meets our requirements.

On a cheerier note, our new "Wee Blue" Ambulance arrived in the first week of February and has been on the road ever since. We would not have been able to purchase this vehicle without the generosity of some local businesses, community councils and individuals. Our thanks go to Brio Retirement Living, Kepak McIntosh Donald, Macphie of Glenbervie, Michies Chemist and Meikle Carewe Wind Farm. The individuals who provided donations were local businessmen Colin Lawson and Graham Thom. From the local communities we received funds from Newtonhill Common Good Fund, Newtonhill Community Council, Portlethen Town Association, and lastly a grant from Aberdeenshire Council. CROSS, NOT CROSSING!

Villagers are refusing to take the loss of a well-used bridge lying down — with a campaign for a new Elsick Burn crossing in full swing.

Walkers, cyclists, dog owners and schoolchildren are among those cut off from easy access to popular routes.

Not to mention a couple who now struggle to get essential deliveries such as heating oil – and fear a fire engine would not reach them in an emergency.

Aberdeenshire Council demolished the bridge as a safety precaution in October. Repairs had been halted after they found the foundations of the pretty $19^{\rm th}$ century structure were unsound.

But replacing it is not as high on the cash-strapped council's priority list as residents hoped - sitting 21st with little prospect of a quick fix despite local Councillor Mel Sullivan's success in getting it pushed up seven places.

The scoring system focuses on disruption to the road network rather than the impact on public health, routes to school or disabled access.

People with mobility issues have to negotiate the steep slope down towards the old mill to get to the beach or East Cammachmore.

And the large number of people who used the crossing for walks and rides around Cranhill and beyond face a long diversion via the village centre.

Petitioning the council to review its prioritisation was among actions agreed at a well-attended public meeting at the Bettridge Centre on 26 January.

A Facebook Group set up to keep the community up to date with developments already boasts hundreds of members — and a group of volunteers has formed a committee to agree a wider action plan.

The volunteers are examining a range of options such as raising the money for a like-for-like road bridge — estimated by the local authority to be at least £80,000 - or securing alternative access to the affected home then funding a cheaper burn crossing for cyclists and pedestrians.

The campaign will be conducted with the close support of Newtonhill, Muchalls and Cammachmore Community Council (NMCCC).

Torc Torrance, who is leading the push for action and also speaks on behalf of the local cycling group, said the strength of feeling on the issue was clear. "I'm calling for urgent action to get a new bridge to help us all connect. At the highly successful kick-off meeting we decided on a plan and we have a team who have the capabilities and support to make this happen. "I asked the people of Newtonhill and area to turn up to show our determination and they have answered!"



FRIENDS OF NEWTONHILL

Friends of Newtonhill (FON) is a parent group who supports Newtonhill Primary School with their wish list of wants and needs. Each year the group organises three school discos and a Christmas Fair as a minimum to raise funds for the school. FON has traditionally purchased P1 Painting Aprons with pupils names stitched on and the P7 Leavers Hoodies for the children at the school as their gifts to start and end their time at the school. Recently when Sarah Chew (Chair) and Clare Simpson (Vice Chair) took on the roles in 2021 the challenge was initiated to fundraise to rejuvenate the outside space of the school.

The playground as many of you will know, has very little play equipment and the playground markings were faded. Over the last two years, the group has organised a Race Night, Sponsored Walk, Photo Fundraisers, School Calendars, and Sports Day Picnic to name a few to raise funds for our playground project. We have tried to keep the whole of the community up to date with our fundraising efforts through communications and have implemented a parent app called Class List for parents/careers of the children who attend the school from nursery – P7.

Eve a P5 pupil kindly raised £1000 during her sponsored climb of Ben Nevis and she chose one of our lovely new playground markings for the money to be spent on. We have also been gifted money from the Friday Luncheon Club, the NVA Santa Run and Tesco Newtonhill to boost all the money we have raised from our events.

Now that phase one of our plan is complete, we are looking forward to phase two. We would love to fundraise to purchase more play equipment for the pupils to use, this in turn will also support the wider community. We have been gifted £2500 from WM Donald £400 from the NVA Santa run 2023 and IACS Consulting have also donated £500 so we are well on our way to raising funds and hope to be able to approach the Kincardine and Mearns Committee for match funding in the new financial year 2024/25.

We are currently also raising funds to support the schools current wish list of new reading materials for the whole school at a cost of £1700 and new tablets for the pupils – fundraising for items never stop.
